Our church has lived through the Revolutionary War, the Civil War, the 1918 Pandemic. We've faced internal squabbles over theological issues. We've had serious aesthetic debates over the color of new carpet. We've lived through times of plenty and times of scarcity. But through it all, God's grace has brought us through even the most daunting challenges.

We've faced some unforeseen challenges this past year. But through it all, do you know what excites me most about Goochland Baptist? In a season where it would be easy to turn our focus inward and hunker down, our church family has instead reached outward to bless our community. Earlier this month, a dozen of us put on our masks and traveled to Goochland Cares to take all the food and clothes that our church family donated in the weeks prior to Easter. The leadership of GoochlandCares was thrilled to have a partner like GBC, they told us, because they could count on us to bring them what they needed most. We stayed around all morning to volunteer in their food pantry and their clothes closet. Personally, I was impressed with the scope of their outreach to our community. I'm thankful we can support that. As Jesus said, whenever we clothe the naked or feed the hungry, we're taking care of him, too. Thank you for making that possible.

I'm grateful for all the selfless work our church members have been doing, too, to support our church family and bless our community. Phil Egolf has faithfully mowed the church's grass. George Koch has spent hours working on the church flower beds, making them look beautiful for the spring. Gale Chaisson has organized our clothes closet to collect clothes for GoochlandCares, and Shannon Wilson has coordinated our food collection for GoochlandCares. Mila Spaulding has collected all of our household goods to take to Caritas. Our kitchen crew continue to make upwards of 100 meals for our church family and our community each week - and many of vou take them to those who need them most! Our AV crew has worked hard to make sure our sound and live stream work every Sunday. And on top of all of that, a group of about ten of us spent a weekend attending a virtual fresh expressions conference that's started helpful conversations about creative ways we can reach out to our community.

Throughout history, the churches that have thrived, regardless of circumstance, are the churches who have focused not on themselves, but on others. When you think about it, that's essentially what Jesus says – when we focus inward (and try to save ourselves), we wither. But when we focus on giving of ourselves to others and to Christ, we find life. (See Mark 8:34-35 and Mark 9:34-35.) As we get closer to our 250th birthday, it's my hope that we'll continue to focus our energy outward.

Go back and look at early Christian artwork depicting the crucifixion, and you'll discover something peculiar. There isn't much. And that's because for the early church, Easter proclamation wasn't about death, but about paradise. Not a paradise off in the sky somewhere, but as this world blessed and recreated by the Spirit of God. You see, the early church envisioned Easter not as an isolated, one-time event, but as a universal event that transforms the world. In other words, the resurrection isn't just about Jesus rising from the dead; it's about God's Spirit bringing new life to the whole world. The way the early church saw it, there were little resurrections happening among Christ's followers every day. That was the ongoing part of the Easter miracle. So for six weeks following Easter, we'll be surveying Acts to read about little resurrections – new life brought by God's Spirit – in the lives of Christ's followers in the early church. And we'll learn how to look for little resurrections in today's world, too.
